Welcome to February and the season of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 10. We are having an Ash Wednesday

service at 6 pm. This service is a potluck supper. During the service we will have holy communion, and look ahead to the forty days of Lent. The service will end no later than 7 pm.

We are having a Second Hour hunger theme throughout Lent. Beginning on February 21 COSA (Committee on Social Outreach and Social Action) will hold a series of programs on hunger. We often say, "I'm hungry; what's to eat?" We are blessed to be able to even choose what we want to eat, and how many meals or snacks a day we want to have. Many people, including those living in our community do not have that option. The first session will be on The Causes of Hunger; February 28 will be on The Costs of Hunger; March 6 will look at Hunger in Connecticut; March 13 will examine Hunger in East Hampton, and on March 20 (Palm Sunday) we will have a dinner after worship that will focus on first, second and third world meals. Speaking of food, we will beginning our Supper Club gatherings this month and on Saturday, February 27, Seeds of Hope, our immersion mission program will be holding a "Taste of East Hampton" in our fellowship hall from 2-5 pm. Ten restaurants or food vendors will be available for patrons to sample. Costs are \$10.00 each for adults and \$5.00 for children and \$25.00 for a family. I hope you can join us!

"Is There Enough Food? Hunger Near and Far"

The question of food availability and hunger came to COSA (Committee on Outreach and Social Action) members as we learned more about the global refugee crisis. Photos, articles, TV news and Jesus' commandments to care for one another in his name led us to consider hunger globally and locally. We felt the need for more education and ideas for outreach and social action as we realized that hunger and food availability and distribution has become a growing problem, literally and figuratively.

COSA with Pastor Kennedy is preparing a 5-week seminar for children, youth, and adults during Lent. We hope everyone can stay after worship for 30 minutes for four Sundays beginning February 21. After getting refreshments at Fellowship Hour, adults and youth will meet in Fellowship Hall. We will have time for education, discussion, stories of our experience and some hand-outs to take home. The children will go to one of the classrooms for games and activities related to the topic with Lily Bartel and Alka Arcari. On Palm Sunday, we will eat a special meal together immediately after worship.

February 28: **The Costs of Hunger** physically, emotionally, developmentally, financially

March 6: **Hunger in Connecticut:** A speaker for the Connecticut Food Bank will talk about Hunger in Connecticut and their mission.

March 13: **Hunger in East Hampton:** Sandy Fries, director of the East Hampton Food and Fuel Bank will speak about the local situation and their mission

March 20, Palm Sunday, we will **Build-our-Meal** for lunch. Please stay after worship where you have the choice to eat a little, some, or a lot of food, unlike millions of food insecure people. Reservations will be most helpful for this event.



A Simple, Generous Choice ~ Electronic Giving

Electronic Funds Transfer

(Direct debit from your checking or savings account)

Now available at the Congregational Church of East Hampton Participate Today.

Electronic Giving is a convenient way to provide consistent financial support to our church.

Open your heart without opening your checkbook

Electronic Giving is the term used to describe automatic methods for making contributions on a regular basis without the need to write checks, carry cash or prepare envelopes.

Frequently Asked Questions About Direct Debit Giving

Q. What are the major advantages of electronic giving by direct debit?

A. Direct debit is all about convenience for you and consistency for the church. Electronic giving eliminates frequent check writing and helps members stay on track with pledges even when they are unable to attend services. The church in turn benefits from much-needed donation consistency and a reduction in the volume of check and cash contributions that must be handled and manually processed in the church office.

Q. How does Direct Debit Giving work?

A. Contributions are transferred automatically from your checking or savings account to the church's bank account.

Q. How are my automatic contributions deducted and transferred?

A. First, you sign and return an authorization form to the church indicating the amount you wish to contribute on a regular basis. Contributions are then transferred through the Automated Clearing House (ACH) network—the same network already used by families to make mortgage and utility payments or to receive payroll earnings and Social Security income. Direct debit goes by other names including Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT), automatic payment, or simply, ACH.

Q. When will my contribution be debited from my account?

A. A debit to your account will occur each month on the date you specify on your authorization form.

Q. How will I keep track of contributions in my check register?

A. Since your contribution is made at a pre-established time, you simply record it in your check register on the appropriate date. Electronic contributions will appear on your bank statement.

Q. What can I use to prove I made a contribution?

A. Your bank statement will show an itemized list of electronic transactions that can be used as proof of your contributions.

Q. Is giving by direct debit risky?

A. It is certainly less risky than writing checks or carrying cash to church. To process electronic donations, the church uses Vanco Services, LLC—an established and highly-regarded company that moves funds directly from church members to the church on the same day without any delay. Vanco processes contributions for more than 10,000 churches and nonprofit organizations.

Q. How much does direct debit giving cost?

A. It costs you nothing and it costs the church very little. It is the lowest cost method of transferring funds.

Q. What if I try electronic giving by direct debit and don't like it?

A. You can cancel your authorization at any time by notifying the church.

Q. How can I sign up for electronic giving by direct debit?

A. Complete, sign and return the authorization form on the following page to the church office.

This month, don't just *send* valentines; *be* a valentine! Create these Friendship Cards to express love through kind acts for your loved ones — all month long.




- 29 index cards
